#### Methodology




- Benenson Strategy Group conducted 1304 interviews from June 16-24, 2023, among adults nationwide.
- Interviews were conducted online.
- The margin of error at the 95% confidence level was ±2.60 percentage points (and higher among subgroups).
- Due to rounding, displayed answer choice may not always add up to 100%.

#### **Key Findings**

- Today, Americans are looking for someone who can unite the country, and they want their government to address issues of systemic economic inequalities, poverty, and segregation.
  - More than 4 in 5 believe America is more divided than ever before, and see it as a national issue, rather than a local one. This crisis of disunity is felt across all Americans and there is a strong desire for a narrative change.
- Most across demographics have experienced some form of discrimination and experienced it at a variety of locations and different instances such as while shopping, when at work, or by community members. People feel held back by their economic status and ethnicity, especially POC.
- And despite all this, most remain proud Americans with the hope that things will get better, and common ground can be found. Furthermore, a slight majority believe that Americans all have the same chance at a happy and comfortable life, signaling that while they have experienced discrimination, they want to believe things can and will be better.
- Americans want respect regardless of their opinions, ideology, or raceand they will respect others as long as they are good people.

- This hope for the future is connected to a strong sense of community which spans across most Americans, with a community being a place for a shared common purpose where one feels accepted and welcome. Religion is a large part of community, though shared values can also substitute faith.
- Most believe that promoting diversity in the workplace and education spaces will help heal the division we see in our country today. Taking steps to respectfully navigate differing opinions is also a necessary step.
- There is a clear generational divide, with Americans younger than 50 years old consistently holding different opinions than their older counterparts. Messaging to older and younger people will have to be differentiated, as will messaging between white Americans and Americans of color.








### The younger generations do not feel the country is divided as much as older generations, although they feel less American pride.





### The concern around disunity takes root at a national level rather than in their own communities; the feeling that division exists is a politically driven, national narrative


How much do you worry about disunity in...






#### Americans across the board feel that the country needs more respect and empathy, specifically around discord that pertains to differing opinions and diversity

#### % who agree with each statement






What are the most important values and ideas that America needs more of? % who ranked each choice among top 3


How hopeful are you that Americans can work through their differences and find lasting common ground in the future?






#### "American Experience" CURRENT INEQUITIES

#### Still, belief that inequities exists in America is split, though slightly tilted toward the belief that all have a fair chance





Frequency of experiencing instances of racism or discrimination






About a third report racism or discrimination while shopping, at work, or by community members- and these experiences span across all, though Black people especially know what these experiences are like

Notably, barriers to success in America remain in place, with almost all sub-groups knowing what it is like to be held back by their economic status, and over half of POC feeling their ethnicity is a barrier


How much of a barrier do you feel any of the following have been towards your personal and professional success?





### A plurality of people feel that community means living in the same area, and people feel most connected to their neighborhoods







Most Americans identify as a religious or spiritual person- especially among Black individuals and Republicans... conversely, younger generations, and Democrats have stronger personal values rather than religion




More than three quarters interact with people from all different racial or religious backgrounds... though surprisingly younger generations and POC are the ones interacting more with people of similar backgrounds











### Americans strongly believe to forge a united path forward the country must find news way of navigating differing opinions







The Key Messaging Principles to form a United Voice				
RESPECT	Messaging that embodies empathy and respect for all individuals, regardless of their political or cultural beliefs, sets the foundation for compassionate relationship building.			
STORYTELLING	Once we have established a foundation of empathy and respect, it is essential to create a new narrative that effectively combines the diverse experiences and viewpoints that exist in America. By doing so, we can foster greater understanding and promote unity.			
SHARED PURPOSE	By establishing a strong foundation of empathy and respect and creating an inclusive message that embraces diverse experiences and viewpoints, we can inspire Americans to transform the current narrative and find common ground, even when they hold differing views. Messengers who can deliver a positive message of change, regardless of their personal beliefs, play a vital role in this process.			
TRANSFORMERS	The messengers of change are key to delivering a unified message. Americans are confident that there are transformers in their communities who can take a negative message and turn it into a positive one, promoting unity and healing across the nation.			
ENGAGEMENT	Finally, there is an appetite for racial healing in America. Through messaging that encourages people to engage with, and attempt to understand, Americans of different racial or other backgrounds, we can harness that pre-existing desire for unity and use it to promote dialog based on empathy and respect.



## Appendix

Most Americans agree that the healthcare system is unequal; while race is not the most cited factor that influences healthcare, over half feel it does affect care





#### **Headlines**

- Americans believe that relationship building is the key to overcoming division in our country.
  - A plurality of Americans feel it is the most important thing we can do to come together as a nation, with more than twice as many Americans selecting it than any other option.
  - This resonates especially with Republicans Americans over 50, 42% and 37% of whom, respectively, feel that relationship building is most important.
- There is a clear generational divide when it comes to opinions on racial healing and disunity in America.
  - Americans younger than 50 are less likely to feel that the U.S. is more divided now than ever and they are more hopeful about the future.
- Americans across the political spectrum, including over 75% of Republicans, feel that educating our children on the history of racism is important for racial healing.
  - 51% of people overall say that education is *very* important, including 53% of white Americans and 40% of Republicans.

- Despite majorities of Americans across demographics sharing a sense that the United States is more divided than ever before, two-thirds remain optimistic about the future.
  - 86% of Americans agree that the U.S. is more divided than ever before, with Republicans (89%) a bit more likely to agree than Democrats (83%).
  - 67% of Americans are at least somewhat hopeful for the future.
- Americans think increasing workplace diversity is an important step to reducing division and healing the harms of racism.
  - This includes 81% overall and 78% of Republicans.
  - Regardless of why they are being discriminated against, Americans are most concerned about impacts to employment.
